Cunderdin Rotary Tree Project



James Stokes has a property in Cunderdin adjacent to the Mortlock River, in an area where there are salinity issues. Cunderdin Rotary Club applied for a Small Community Grant in 2012 to revegetate the area of the property beside the waterway.

The landscape has been destroyed by rising water table and accompanying salinity issues. The aim is to plant salt tolerant tree species to increase the biodiversity of the area. Plants put in include Eucalyptus loxophleba subsp lissophola, Callistemon phoeniceus (Firey bottle brush), Eucalyptus leucoxylon var rosea (Pink Flowering

Gum), Eucalyptus torquate (Coral Gum), Eucalyptus occidentalis (Flat topped yate), Melaleuca thyoides (Salt water tee tree), Casuarina obesa (Salt water She oak), Eucalyptus kondininensis (Kondinin Blackbutt), Eucalyptus salmonophloia (Salmon Gum), Melaleuca hamulosa, Melaleuca radula, Melaleuca viminalis (mohan), Atriplex nummularia (old man

salt bush), Eucalyptus kochii. These trees were provided by local nurseries Chatfields in Tammin and Westgrow Farm Trees in Meckering.

The soil was ripped and mounded to minimize impact of waterlogging.

There was about 31 people involved in the planting—26 on Saturday 14th July and 17 on Sunday 15th July with some overlap of days.
